- Last Saturday Offertory 2/17/2024 \$5.00

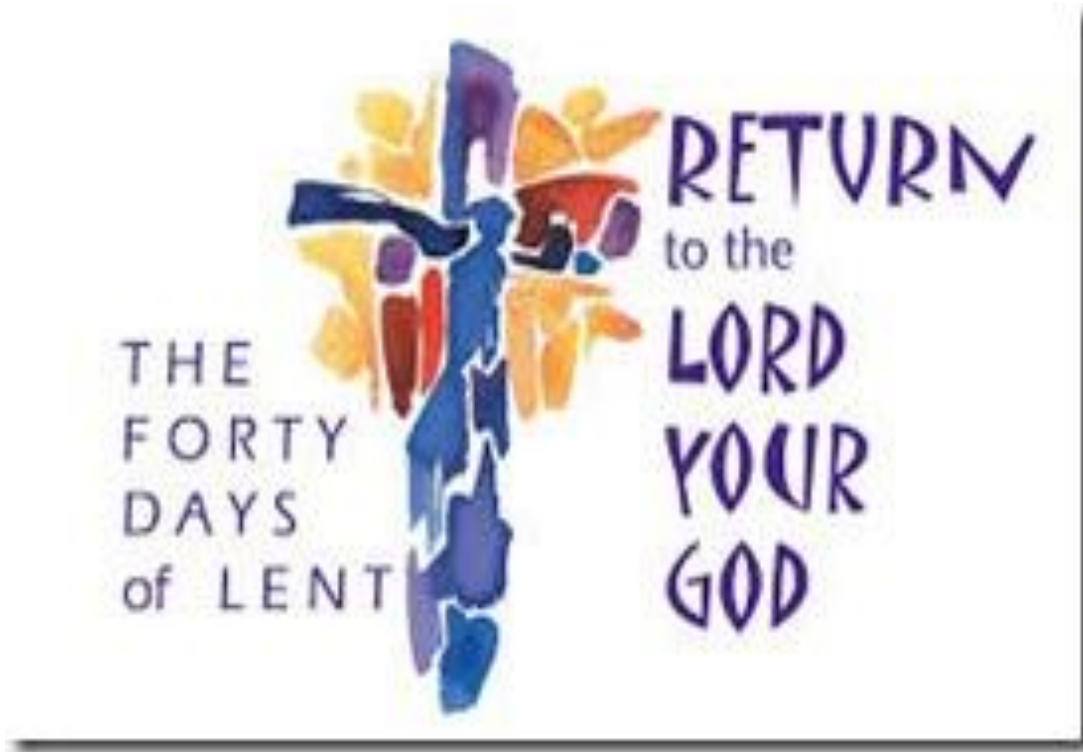
Dear Holy Cross Parish,

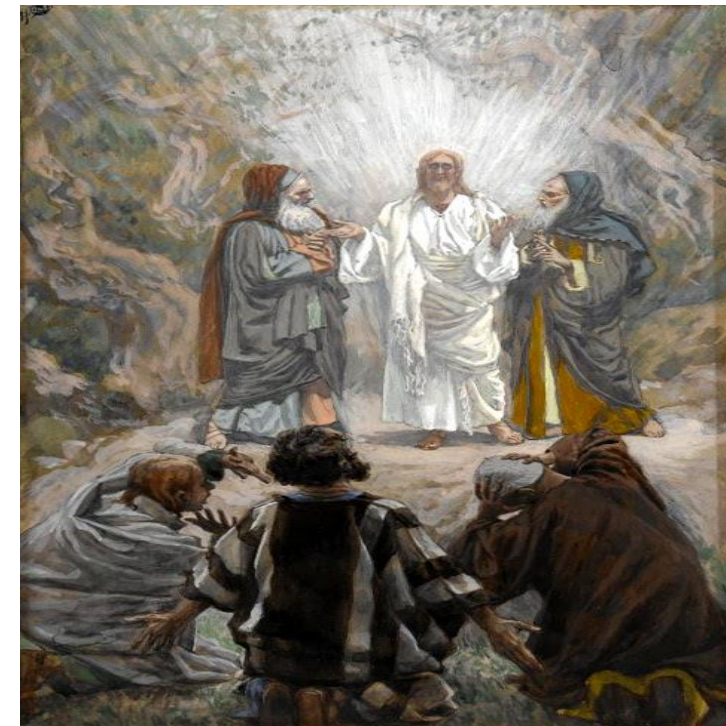
Gospel Reflection:

God calls Abram to leave his country on the strength of a promise of future greatness. Abram trusts God and goes on trusting through the difficult journey ahead. In the Gospel Jesus and three of his disciples journey to the top of a mountain, the traditional place where God speaks and shows himself. Jesus again hears his own call, a reminder of who he is and the great trial that lies ahead. Peter, James, and John, the same three disciples who will be with him during the agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, are blessed with a vision of Jesus as the Lord in all his glory. They hear God's voice and clear call: "This is my beloved Son with whom I am well pleased; listen to him." This vision and call move them down the mountain and toward the promise of glory on the other side of suffering.
