Dear Holy Cross Parish,

The three main things the Church focuses on during Lent are prayer, fasting and giving, or charity.

Prayer during Lent focuses on our need for God’s forgiveness. It’s also about repenting and receiving God’s grace and mercy.

Fasting, or giving something up in order to become more aware of God, can be a reminder of Jesus’ sacrifice. That time can also provide more time to connect with God.

Giving money or time to others is a way to respond to God’s grace, generosity, and love.

None of these devotional practices can help us earn or deserve Jesus’ gift of salvation on the Cross. Only Jesus has the power to rescue us from our sinfulness. Spending time in prayer, fasting, and giving can make Jesus’ sacrifice on Good Friday even more meaningful. Let’s journey together.

Gospel Reflection:

According to Jewish law, lepers were considered unclean and outcasts from society. Yet in today's Gospel, Jesus immediately responds to a leper's request for healing. Jesus had great respect for the Law of Mose, so he told the leper to fulfill the cleansing requirements by offering sacrifice and appearing before the priest. Jesus orders him to tell no one who had cured him, but the leper ignores Jesus' command and tells everyone what happened. In spite of the growing difficulties of his ministry, Jesus continues healing and preaching. He was able to proceed because people had faith in him.
